


Who Are Family Caregivers?

Family Caregiver Facts



- In 2019, at least 53 million people were providing informal, usually unpaid, care and support to aging family members and people of all ages with disabilities
- Lost income due to family caregiving is estimated to be \$522
 billion each year
- Impact of COVID-19 pandemic increased momentum of caregiving as a public health issue

Federal Programming for Caregivers



- The <u>National Family Caregiver Support Program</u> funds a variety of supports that help family and informal caregivers care for older adults in their homes for as long as possible
- The <u>Lifespan Respite Care Program</u> works to improve the delivery and quality of respite services for caregivers of older adults and people with disabilities

GOAL 1 Increase awareness and outreach

GOAL 2 Build partnerships and engagement with family caregivers

GOAL 3 Strengthen services and supports

GOAL 4 Ensure financial and workplace security

GOAL 5 Expand data, research, and evidence-based practices

RAISE Process



- The <u>RAISE Family Caregivers Act</u>, which became law on Jan. 22, 2018, directs the Secretary of Health and Human Services to develop a national family caregiving strategy.
 - Appropriations started at around \$100k and has increased to \$400k
- The RAISE Family Caregiver Resource and Dissemination Center
 - RAISE Faculty has been guiding the process behind the scenes
- Sunset Extension
 - Older Americans Act provision extended RAISE authority 1 year
- Public Meetings
 - November 18, 2020, to bring the caregivers voice into the process
 - Listening sessions and <u>video vignettes</u>
 - September 21, 2021, to share our vision for the National Strategy

RAISE National Strategy



On September 21, 2022, the **2022 National Strategy to Support Family Caregivers** was delivered to Congress.

- 2022 National Strategy to Support Family Caregivers An overview and description of the strategy's goals and intended outcomes
- <u>First Principles: Cross-Cutting Considerations for Family Caregiver Support</u> Describes
 the four key principles that must be reflected in all efforts to improve support to family
 caregivers
- <u>Federal Actions</u> Nearly 350 actions that 15 federal agencies will take in the near term to begin to implement the strategy.
- Actions for States, Communities, and Others More than 150 actions others can take.

Implementing the RAISE Act



- Public comment period ending November 30th
- State and local engagement on priority actions
- Publicizing the RAISE Act

Family Caregiver Issues

Awareness and Outreach



- Caregiving as a public health issue
- Empowering caregivers to identify the important role they play so that they can receive supports if they need them
- Need for accessible, linguistically and culturally competent communications and awareness campaigns

Engagement



- Health systems and other institutions (legal systems, education, etc.) do not value or engage with family caregivers
- COVID-19 pandemic exacerbated this issue
- Need to fully integrate family caregivers in the care process

Access to Services and Supports



- Education and training
- Respite care, counseling and peer support
- Trauma-informed and culturally appropriate services
- Increased funding for existing programs (Medicaid, ACL's National Family Caregiver Support Program, Lifespan Respite Program, Alzheimer's Disease Programs Initiative)

Financial/Workplace Support



- Paid family caregiving and tax credits
- Paid leave and sick time for caregiving
- Caregiver-friendly workplaces
- Financial assistance with out-of-pocket costs

Uplifting Family Caregiver Voices

Reaching Underengaged Communities



- By 2030, nearly 3 in 10 older Americans will identify as a member of at least one diverse or underrepresented group
- Due to systemic racism, implicit bias, and other structural factors, caregivers in these groups do not receive appropriate and sufficient supports
- Must recognize and respond to the intersectional identities of caregivers

Caregiver Identification



- Many caregivers don't identify as such
- Some cultures do not have terms for people who provide informal support to others
- Describe caregiving in terms of tasks, not title to be inclusive as possible

Changing the Care Conversation Project



- Build the coalition and grassroots power of a diverse group of family caregivers to advance state and federal policy solutions that improve support for family caregivers
- Provide training, technical assistance and an online learning community as well as funding so organizations can participate in these activities
- Focus will be on building strategies/skills for moving policy change and on building policy expertise

Including the Caregiver Perspective in Existing Advocacy



- Include family caregivers as a stakeholder group
- Identify family caregivers who are already part of your advocacy
- Follow the work of local, state, and national caregiver advocacy groups
 - Engage with local groups that support caregivers
 - Most states have a state caregiver coalition
